

KARTIK PUNAM FESTIVAL IN VARTAL

There was a drastic rise in the number of devotees that had arrived in Vartal. Consequently, Shri Hari declared, "Let us all go to the large grove of mango trees on the outskirts and instruct all the devotees to reside there. We will also hold the daily satsang assemblies there."

A raised seat was prepared under a large, leafy mango tree, with a cotton stuffed and silk covered mattress and pillows as back and head rests. Shri Hari sat on the seat and met his sadhus, embracing the elderly sadhus who had come for the festival.

The devotees of Vartal had arranged meals for the guests. Shriji Maharaj praised the food cooked for him by Gangama (of Jetalpur). Whenever Gangama served food to Shri Hari she would do so with great love, as if she was serving her only child. Quite often, she would insist and place morsels in Maharaj's mouth, and that was why Maharaj called her mother.

After having his evening meal, Maharaj came and sat under the mango tree. The place was illuminated with oil torches and lamps. A question-answer session followed between Maharaj and his sadhus till midnight. Thereafter, Shri Hari retired to bed.

Next morning, on the day of Punam (full moon), Shri Hari finished his daily rituals and came to the assembly venue beneath the mango tree, where the devotees were waiting for him.

YOUR CHHOGU (TASSEL) HAS PIERCED MY MIND

Shri Hari was dressed in white clothes, with a handkerchief in his hand and wearing a white pagh. The loose tassel on Shri Hari's pagh fluttered because of the breeze and attracted the attention of everyone. The assembly hailed the jai of Sahajanand Swami and stood up to honour him. Shri Hari sat on his seat and blessed all with his divine glance and smile. Subsequently, an overwhelming inner joy filled the hearts of all.

Then, Brahmanand Swami began singing in his sweet, baritone and devotional voice, describing the tassel on Shri Hari's pagh and the joy he experienced at his darshan, "Tāru chhogu māre āvi ne chitt mā rahyu..." – "Your tassel has entered and remained in my mind..." The singing was accompanied with the beats of a dukkad (percussion instrument) and the sound of a sarod (a string instrument). The rendition evoked a mesmerizing ambience. Everyone's attention was transfixed on Shri Hari's chhogu (tassel) and pagh. Shri Hari brushed his hands on his chhogu and commented, "The chhogu is jad (inanimate) and [my] form is chaitanya (animate)."

Brahmanand Swami responded, "Maharaj, everything that is associated with you is *chaitanya*, *divya* (divine) and *madhur* (sweet)."

Shri Hari merely smiled to acknowledge his

words. Then, Brahmanand Swami was further enthused and became overwhelmed by the beauty of Shri Hari's clothes and jewellery. He thus sang another bhajan. The whole assembly of swamis and devotees became absorbed and swayed to the tune and words of the bhajan. When Brahmanand Swami finished singing, Shri Hari, too, was touched by his loving devotion. He said, "Listen swamis and devotees! When one realizes Bhagwan's form in one's atma, then the experience of divine joy makes one oblivious to the world. You have attained that Bhagwan's form. The Vedas say that Bhagwan's form is indescribable because it is infinite, above Akshar and transcendental. In the past, many divine avatars had taken birth on earth and the devotees, out of their love and upasana for them, had attained their respective abodes. However, today, you have been blessed with the highest attainment, my form and bliss of my eternal Akshardham." On hearing Shri Hari reveal his supreme form and divine abode, a wave of ineffable joy engulfed the assembly. Maharaj's words dissolved their doubts and strengthened their belief and faith in him.

It was afternoon by the time the Punam festival concluded. Then, Narupant Nana arrived from Vadodara, on behalf of Maharaja Sayajirao of Vadodara, to offer an invitation to Vadodara. Shri Hari read the invitation and informed that he would come to Vadodara on Kartik *vad* 3. Narupant Nana was very pleased and took leave from Maharaj to make preparations for his arrival.

Shri Hari departed from Vartal and arrived at Sankarda. Accompanying him were Gopalanand Swami, Nityanand Swami, Muktanand Swami and other swamis. There was also a large number of devotees, including, Dada Khachar, the Dharmakul, Somla Khachar, Sura Khachar, and parshads. Shri Hari camped for the night on a farm outside Sankarda village.

PRINCE OF VADODARA HONOURS SHRI HARI IN CHHANI

The next day, Shri Hari departed from Sankarda

and arrived at Chhani, located on the outskirts of Vadodara. On 28 November 1825 (Kartak vad 3, Samvat 1882), the King of the Gaekwad kingdom sent his son, Prince Ganpat Rao, with an impressive army to Chhani village to honour Shriji Maharaj with great pomp and fanfare. As the prince approached Chhani, he saw Shri Hari astride on his mare, Manki. Instantly, Ganpat Rao got off his horse and offered prostrations to Shri Hari. On seeing him, Maharaj quickly alighted his horse and held Ganpat Rao's hand. The prince conveyed his father's pranams and respects. He then revealed, "Maharaj it is my father's command to welcome you to Vadodara with profuse honour and joy. In addition, my father has sent Narupant Nana to make whatever arrangements you desire. We have brought decorated elephants, chariots, horses and musicians for your procession through the city. You may now climb into the golden howdah on the elephant's back. Then, as per your instructions, we will help arrange for others to sit accordingly in the vehicles we have brought."

Shri Hari was happy and pleased with the king's sentiments and the prince's words. Then, Maharaj sat in the golden howdah. Muktanand Swami and Shuk Muni sat on the second elephant and Acharyas Ayodhyaprasadji and Raghuvirji sat on the third elephant. Behind the three elephants were palanquins, the king's soldiers, chariots and Shri Hari's *parshads* mounted on horses. Thereafter, the Kathi Darbars and other devotees joined the long procession.

Word had already spread in all of Vadodara that Sayajirao Gaekwad had invited Bhagwan Swaminarayan, and a royal procession would be carried out to honour and welcome him.

SIGHT OF VADODARA CITY

The king's administrators and men had decked the entire city. The roads were cleaned, sprinkled with water and made fragrant. The king's buildings were decorated with festoons of *asopalav* leaves, oil lamps and illumined earthenware pots. The entire route of Shri Hari's procession was decorated with flowers, *asopalav* leaves and arches made of banana trunks. The arrangements for the grand welcome reflected the king's respect and reverence for Shri Hari.

In front of the procession, various wind and percussion instrument players heralded Shri Hari's arrival. The orchestra of auspicious musical sounds drew the citizens to witness the divine spectacle. Flags symbolizing dharma fluttered high in the sky, members of a *raas* group danced vibrantly to the beats of mrudang. *Parshads* on horses circled Shri Hari to guard him.

The entire procession and Shri Hari's resplendent *murti* mesmerized the onlookers. Many had heard of Bhagwan Swaminarayan's name, Muktanand Swami's victory in a debate in Vadodara and Gopalanand Swami's display of yogic powers.

DIVINE PROCESSION

Shri Hari's procession entered the Laheripura Gate. A vast concourse had gathered for Bhagwan Swaminarayan's darshan. Many women folk did darshan from their balconies and terraces. Some pious women welcomed Shri Hari by showering flowers made of gold and silver. Some gestured by placing their hands on the sides of their foreheads with the sentiment that nothing bad happens to him. Many women did not even blink their eyes while doing darshan of Maharaj's wonderful murti. Everything, from the sound of the music to the loud jais honouring Bhagwan Swaminarayan, impressed upon the hearts of all. The citizens thought that the annual Dashera procession arranged by King Sayajirao was undoubtedly grand, but they had never experienced such divinity and spiritual joy as in Maharaj's procession.

Shri Hari cast his glance all around him

and whoever received it was blessed with inner purity, devotion and divinity. This was Bhagwan's godliness.

TO GRANT MOKSHA IS IN YOUR HANDS

Shri Hari's procession reached near the Rajrajeshwar Mahadev Mandir. A pious Brahmin was devoutly doing darshan of Shri Hari from a platform by the mandir. Maharaj glanced at him and the Brahmin understood that Shri Hari was calling him. He thus sprang up and ran towards Maharaj, but the *parshads* did not allow him to go through. However, Shri Hari gestured to his *parshads* and they allowed him to come to him. The Brahmin prayed humbly, "Prabhu, Shivji has sent me to meet you. Presently, *moksha* is in your's and your sadhu's hands."

Shri Hari smiled at his prayer. Narupant Nana was fanning Shri Hari. The latter told Narupant Nana, "Take this aspirant to Gopalanand Swami because he is very pious." Thereafter, Shri Hari's procession proceeded ahead.

MAHARAJA SAYAJI RAO HOLDS SHRI HARI'S HAND

As soon as the procession arrived at the royal palace, Maharaja Sayajirao came down the stairs of his palace. The elephant knelt down and Shri Hari stepped out of the howdah and climbed down the small ladder. Maharaja Sayajirao instantly held Maharaj's hand to support him. Then, Maharaja Sayajirao bent low, bowed to Shri Hari, took the holy dust of his feet and applied it to his head. The king honoured Maharaj with a big garland of roses while the Brahmins sang Vedic mantras. He also performed *pujan* and applied a *chandlo* and a few rice grains on his forehead.



^{1.} The Brahmin was called Karunashankar Pandya of village Dabhoi. Later on, he pilgrimaged to all the Sampradaya's mandirs in search of inner peace. Eventually, after arriving in Junagadh, he experienced peace and divinity on doing the darshan of Gunatitanand Swami. He asked Swami, "I have visited all the mandirs, but I have experienced that satsang has become old and weak. Whereas, here the satsang is young and vibrant. Why is this so?"

Gunatitanand Swami smiled and replied, "The reason is that Bhagwan is manifest here."

MAHANT SWAMI MAHARAJ'S VICHARAN

14 December 2024 to 12 February 2025 Dar es Salaam, Nairobi and Johannesburg



The *vicharan* report in this issue includes Swamishri's visits to Dar es Salaam, Tanzania (14 to 31 December),* Nairobi, Kenya (31 December 2024 to 28 January 2025) and Johannesburg, South Africa (28 January to 12 February 2025).

On 13 December 2024, Swamishri departed at night from Ahmedabad and landed early morning at Julius Nyerere International Airport in Dar es Salaam after a six-and-a-half hour journey by plane. The purpose of Swamishri's vicharan was 'Africa Rangvu Chhe', i.e. to immerse all in devotion and satsang, perform the murti-pratishtha rituals at the newly built mandir in Dar es Salaam, celebrate the silver jubilee festival of Nairobi mandir and to inaugurate and perform the murti-pratishtha ceremony of the newly constructed BAPS Cultural Complex in Johannesburg.

MAHANT SWAMI MAHARAJ'S ARRIVAL IN DAR ES SALAAM

14 December 2024

In the serene early hours of Saturday, 14 December 2024, Mahant Swami Maharaj graced the city of Dar es Salaam with his divine presence. Arriving at Julius Nyerere International Airport at precisely 2.07 a.m. from Ahmedabad, India, Swamishri was honoured, while seated in his plane, with a majestic water salute, a tribute befitting his spiritual eminence. Following his arrival, Swamishri proceeded to the White Sands Resort, reaching at 3.30 a.m., where an atmosphere of devotion and warmth awaited him.

The reception was both heartfelt and vibrant. Enthusiastic children from the local African community performed a traditional dance, infusing the occasion with cultural richness and joy. During a brief yet profound 15-minute assembly, Swamishri gave darshan, emanating spiritual peace and bliss. He was warmly welcomed by Kothari Priyavrat Swami and other swamis, along with devotees who celebrated his arrival with deep reverence and joy.

The gathering rekindled cherished memories of Swamishri's previous visits, particularly his stay in 2019 during the *Divyam Shibir* from 8 to 19 August.


Adding to the historic significance of

Swamishri's present visit, it marked the first occasion where Shri Akshar-Purushottam Maharaj was ceremoniously welcomed at the White Sands Resort. To honour Swamishri, three exquisite fresh flower garlands and one specially crafted garland were lovingly presented by devotees, marking a moment of profound reverence and devotion.

The White Sands Resort, which hosted Mahant Swami Maharaj for 12 unforgettable days in August 2019, once again became sanctified through his presence. Swamishri was visiting after 1,822 days since his last historic visit. The late Subashbhai Patel, who had been a devoted participant during previous visits, was fondly remembered for his contributions and devotion.

Swamishri had completed his nitya puja aboard the flight and so he went to sleep. The initial days of his stay, from 14 to 17 December, were dedicated to restful seclusion. Devotees eagerly anticipated the commencement of the festivities on 18 December, which promised to be a transformative period of divine blessings, spiritual rejuvenation and unparalleled grace.

The motto of Swamishri's satsang tour was, 'Africa Rangvu Chhe.'



SACRED TRANSITION

Chalan Vidhi of Swaminarayan Mandir Murtis 15 December 2024, Dar es Salaam

The Chalan Vidhi is a deeply significant ritual in Hindu tradition, marking the respectful transfer of a deity's divine presence (*prana*) from a *murti* (image) into a temporary medium, usually a sacred *kalash* (vessel). This ceremonial process is performed when a *murti* needs to be moved, replaced, renovated, or retired, ensuring that the sanctity of the deity is preserved throughout the transition.

On 15 December, a momentous Chalan Vidhi ceremony was conducted at the temporary BAPS Swaminarayan Mandir in Dar es Salaam by Shrutiprakash Swami and Brahmins. Pujya Tyagvallabh Swami and Anandswarup Swami performed the sacred rituals for the *murtis* of Swaminarayan Bhagwan, Gunatitanand Swami, Radha-Krishna Bhagwan, the Guru Parampara, Hanumanji and Ganapatiji.





VISHWASHANTI MAHAYAGNA

Vedic Prayers for Peace, Protection & Global Harmony 18 December 2024, Dar es Salaam

on 18 December, a Vishwashanti Mahayagna was performed at the BAPS Swaminarayan Sports & Cultural Centre, on the occasion of the inauguration of the new BAPS Swaminarayan Mandir, Dar es Salaam. This grand event featured approximately 90 *kunds* (sacrificial pits) and saw the participation of 1,300 *yajmans*.



Preparations for the *yagna* in Dar es Salaam had started a month earlier. A dedicated team of swamis and devotees from Mwanza and Dar es Salaam worked together to organize the event. About 20 volunteers, including both men and women, arrived in Dar es Salaam on 12 December to prepare the *kunds* and decorate them with various Vedic symbols. The entire team collaborated to ensure the success of the event, handling tasks such as *kund* setup and assembling *yagna* preparation bags and equipment.

The *yagna* started at around 8 a.m. and commenced with Anandswarup Swami performing the *pujan* of the sacred lamp.

The yagna yajmans were blessed with the divine darshan of Mahant Swami Maharaj's Shri Akshar-Purushottam Maharaj. Around 11 a.m., as cool weather and gentle rains added to the serene



atmosphere, Mahant Swami Maharaj graced the yagna shala.

With deep reverence, the swamis performed pujan of Mahant Swami Maharaj. Swamishri performed the pujan and arti of Shri Akshar-Purushottam Maharaj. Swamishri was accompanied by Pujya Tyagvallabh Swami, Pujya Ishwarcharan Swami, Anandswarup Swami and other swamis.

In his presence, the *murtis* of Shri Akshar-Purushottam Maharaj, Radha-Krishna Bhagwan, Shri Hanumanji, Shri Ganapatiji, and the Guru Parampara were ceremonially worshipped.






WELCOME ASSEMBLY

18 December 2024, Dar es Salaam

GRAND SPIRITUAL CONVERGENCE IN DAR ES SALAAM

In an extraordinary departure from Dar es Salaam's typically hot December climate, Wednesday, 18 December, unfolded with a calm and refreshing ambience. Many attributed this to the divine presence of *guruhari* Mahant Swami

This evening marked Mahant Swami Maharaj's first assembly with the devotees and residents of Dar es Salaam since his arrival on 13 December. Held at the iconic BAPS Swaminarayan Sports Complex in Mikocheni, the assembly was historic for hosting the inaugural welcome of Shri Akshar-Purushottam Maharaj and Swamishri in the region.

The evening began with the resonant chants of the Swaminarayan *dhun* and melodious bhajans, creating a serene and spiritually uplifting atmosphere. Adding to the significance of the gathering was the sacred Akshat Tula ceremony.

A GRAND PROCESSION OF SHRI AKSHAR-PURUSHOTTAM MAHARAJ

The evening's highlight was the majestic entry of Shri Akshar-Purushottam Maharaj. One *palkhi* carried Mahant Swami Maharaj's Shri Akshar-Purushottam Maharaj, while the other carried the Dar es Salaam Mandir's

Shri Akshar-Purushottam Maharaj. Devotees bore the *palkhis* on their shoulders amidst the harmonious sounds of traditional instruments.

On reaching the stage, Shri Akshar-Purushottam Maharaj and Swamishri were honoured with the traditional *shodshopchar pujan*. Then, the trustees and devotees offered handmade chocolates, Tanzanian spices, dry fruits, fresh fruits, and cashew nuts.

CULTURAL FUSION: A UNIQUE PERFORMANCE

A captivating blend of cultural dances and African folk stunts celebrated the arrival of Shri Akshar-Purushottam Maharaj and guruhari Mahant Swami Maharaj. The vibrant performance, titled 'Karibu Santo, Karibu Bapa, Avo Padharo Mahant Swami Maharaj,' featured young balaks performing African stunts and local youths showcasing Indian dance steps. This cultural fusion symbolized the unity and mutual respect within the Africa satsang.

The event was further enriched by the presence of Pujya Tyagvallabh Swami, Pujya Ishwarcharan Swami and Anandswarup Swami.

ENLIGHTENING DISCOURSES AND SPIRITUAL BLESSINGS

Pujya Ishwarcharan Swami delivered an

insightful discourse on the profound unity of Bhakta-Bhagwan and Atma-Paramatma, embodied in Akshar-Purushottam Maharaj. He highlighted Gunatitanand Swami's divine role as Akshar and his proclamation of Bhagwan Swaminarayan's true glory.

In his blessings, Mahant Swami Maharaj emphasized the importance of *pratiti* (faith) in *murtis*. He remarked, "These *murtis* you see are none other than *sakshat* Akshar-Purushottam. Infinite universes cannot compare to Bhagwan's magnificence, yet he descended among us to remain close. Our fortune lies in knowing them, and our gratitude is shown through adherence to *agna* and *upasana*."

SACRED AKSHAT TULA CEREMONY

The Akshat Tula ceremony was a moment of immense devotion and joy. Over 2,400 akshat potlis (small bags of unbroken rice) were lovingly prepared by devotees across Tanzania. Mahant Swami Maharaj placed the potlis on the tula to weigh Shri Akshar-Purushottam Maharaj. The ceremony concluded with an arti, followed by an opportunity for the devotees to participate in the tula and receive Swamishri's blessings.

The memorable welcome assembly concluded with *prasad* of *dudhpak*, sanctified by Mahant Swami Maharaj, served to all the attendees.



BHAGWATI DIKSHA MAHOTSAV

n 21 December, Dar es Salaam witnessed a historic spiritual milestone – the first-ever *bhagwati diksha* ceremony. Mahant Swami Maharaj initiated the two *parshads* into the sadhu-fold. The atmosphere at the mandir was alive with devotion, excitement and collective joy – a testament to the strength of faith and commitment.

Bhagirath Bhagat, formerly raised in Dar es Salaam, was named Sadhu Paramshildas and Ruju Bhagat was named Sadhu Divyakirtidas.



GRAND NAGAR YATRA

21 December 2024, Dar es Salaam



n the morning of 21 December, the sun cast a radiant glow over Dar es Salaam. The air buzzed with excitement as devotees eagerly awaited the *nagar yatra* to commence.

The *nagar yatra* spanned 1.1 kilometres and paraded the *murtis* on the main city roads. Thereafter, they would be installed in the three principal mandir shrines.

Devotees from far and wide had gathered to partake in this spiritual celebration, travelling from cities throughout Tanzania, Kenya, Uganda, Zambia, and Malawi. Devotees from India, the UK, USA, South Africa and Canada had also arrived to participate in and witness this historic celebration.

Excitement filled the air at 9.30 a.m. as the *nagar yatra* was about to commence. The *murtis* of Shri Akshar-Purushottam Maharaj, Shri Radha-Krishna, Shri Ghanshyam Maharaj, Guru Parampara, Hanumanji and Ganeshji were paraded through the city in exquisitely decorated floats. The floats were meticulously designed and made by sadhus and craftsmen.

The first float, designed like a majestic peacock, had the *murti* of Shri Ghanshyam Maharaj. The second float carried the *murtis* of Shri Akshar-Purushottam Maharaj. Its unique design reflected the memorial shrine of Guruhari Pramukh Swami Maharaj in Sarangpur. The third exquisite float was dedicated to Shri Radha-Krishna Bhagwan.

The colourful procession started, amidst cheers and joy, after senior BAPS sadhus performed the inaugural Vedic rituals.



The journey began at the Patel Samaj grounds and wound through the city's landmark streets past Azam Roundabout, and then towards India Street to DTV Roundabout. It then turned onto Jamhuri Street and Zanaki Street before culminating at the BAPS Swaminarayan Mandir on Pramukh Swami Road.

Over a hundred BAPS sadhus walked alongside and behind the floats, their saffron robes and devotional chants exuding tranquillity to all who witnessed the procession.

Leading the procession was an African marching band, whose percussion music added rhythmic grace to the charged atmosphere. Devotees from East Africa and abroad followed the sadhus, some of whom waved the BAPS flags and others held flags commemorating the new mandir in Dar es Salaam. Women devotees were traditionally dressed, carrying the decorative *kalash* and plant pots on their heads. Both men and women of various ages were dressed in colourful, traditional attire and joyfully danced in their respective groups.


Local dance performers showcased their remarkable dance talents using stilts and other extraordinary means. BAPS youth volunteers and the local police smoothly managed the procession.

Amidst the delightful chants of *dhun* and singing of bhajans, the local Maharashtrian marching band played percussion instruments in an engaging and captivating manner.

Young girls who had memorized the Sanskrit Satsang Diksha and Siddhant Karika verses followed in a float at the end. They sat around a *yagna kund* and devotionally recited verses from both these texts throughout the procession.

of Dar es Salaam resonated with divine energy as a grand *murti-pratishtha* ceremony marked the opening of the newly constructed BAPS Mandir. This momentous occasion, steeped in faith, devotion and history, unfolded in the esteemed presence of Mahant Swami Maharaj, whose spiritual magnetism drew devotees from across the globe.



The mandir, a beacon of devotion for nearly five decades, traces its origins to 1977 when it began as a small centre of worship. It blossomed into a spiritual sanctuary, re-established in 1999 under the divine guidance of Pramukh Swami Maharaj. Now, in 2024, the mandir celebrated its third re-establishment, standing as a testament to the faith, growth and devotion of its followers.

DAY OF AUSPICIOUSNESS

The opening ceremony took place on the auspicious *tithi* of Maghsar *vad* 7, under the celestial alignment of Uttara Phalguni Nakshatra – the same under which Bhagatji Maharaj was born.

The ceremony began with Vedic prayers led by Shrutiprakash Swami and other learned scholars. Pujya Tyagvallabh Swami, Pujya Ishwarcharan Swami, and Anandswarup Swami performed the sacred consecration *mahapuja* ceremony.

SACRED MURTI-PRATISHTHA

Mahant Swami Maharaj performed the *murti-pratishtha* ritual of the new *murti* of Ghanshyam Maharaj. The original *murtis* of Shri Akshar-Purushottam Maharaj and Shri Radha-Krishna, formerly consecrated by Pramukh Swami Maharaj in 1999, were re-consecrated by Pujya Tyagvallabh Swami and Pujya Ishwarcharan Swami, respectively.

The event also included the re-consecration of the *abhishek murti* of Nilkanth Varni by Anandswarup Swami.

The new marble *murtis* of Bhagatji Maharaj and Yogiji Maharaj were consecrated by Rajeshwar Swami, while Yogendra Swami consecrated the *murtis* of Shastriji Maharaj and Pramukh Swami Maharaj.

The *murtis*, adorned in regal red and yellow garments with ornate crowns, radiated divine majesty. The consecration ritual included the *nyas vidhi*, wherein the *prana* (life force) was ritually infused into each *murti* by using a *darbh shalakha*, a stick made of sacred grass.

The ritual concluded with the opening of the *murtis*' eyes using a gold-tipped point dipped in honey, followed by showing them a mirror to receive their first divine gaze.

Finally, Mahant Swami Maharaj addressed the assembly, emphasizing the sanctity of the consecrated *murtis*. He clarified that the *murtis* are not mere stone figures but manifestations of God's divine presence. He urged devotees to visit the mandir daily, participate in *arti* and darshan, and make the mandir a source of spiritual enrichment. He guided that if the mandir was seen merely as a structure, its purpose would be lost, but if used as a place to connect with God, its full potential would be realized. Then, Swamishri prayed for the happiness of all who had contributed to the mandir. Mahant Swami Maharaj expressed his appreciation for the mandir with a graceful hand gesture, conveying his admiration for its beauty and sanctity.

EVENING CELEBRATION

In the evening, the celebrations continued with a cultural programme themed, 'Hamare Mandir Hai Pehchan.' Then, Mahant Swami Maharaj urged devotees to view the mandir as their own home, encouraging *seva* with ownership, which he explained would lead to purity of life and spiritual growth.

The evening ended with a spectacular fireworks display lighting up the night sky as devotees caught a glimpse of Swamishri on the mandir balcony.

The grand opening of the Dar es Salaam BAPS Mandir marked the beginning of a new chapter for the local and global spiritual community – one filled with hope, devotion and unwavering faith.

This remarkable day stood as a shining example of devotion, unity and the transformative power of a mandir to instil peace and values in its community, whilst providing women a platform for growth and progress.

A JOURNEY OF FAITH

Dar es Salaam Mandal's balaks lead the Vedic mahapuja project



In an inspiring initiative that spanned over 80 days, the young balaks and shishus of the Dar es Salaam Mandir engaged in an extraordinary seva from the auspicious day of ekadashi, 19 May to 31 August 2024. A dedicated group of 24 balaks and shishus, along with 23 karyakars and kishores, worked tirelessly to perform 224 mahapujas in the homes of over 3,115 families, contributing more than 300 hours to this divine service.

Their mission was to bring the divine experience of 'Ghare Ghare Mahapuja', into the homes of devotees, offering Vedic prayers for peace, harmony and success. This unique project had a twofold purpose: to personally invite families to the upcoming Dar es Salaam Mandir Mahotsav in the presence of Mahant Swami Maharaj, and to raise funds for the installation of Ghanshyam Maharaj's *murti*.

BALANCING FAITH, STUDIES AND SEVA

The commitment demonstrated by the *balaks* was truly inspiring. A typical day for them began

with an early rise at 5 a.m. After attending school, they would return home, complete their homework and attend tuition before heading to the mandir by 6 p.m. From there, they travelled to the homes of *yajmans* (hosts) to conduct the *mahapuja*, often not returning home until 8.30 p.m. After dinner, they would go to bed. Despite their demanding schedules, these *balaks* excelled in their studies while fulfilling their *seva* with the utmost dedication.

On some days, the groups performed up to nine *mahapujas* in a single day! Their determination to please Mahant Swami Maharaj was the driving force behind their extraordinary efforts.

PREPARATION AND PERFECTION

Before embarking on this project, the 24 balaks and shishus spent three weeks, rigorously learning and memorizing the mahapuja in Sanskrit. Despite some of them not being fluent in Gujarati, let alone Sanskrit, they impressively mastered the prayers under the guidance of karyakars and swamis through Zoom classes.

On the final day of training, they had to pass a practical exam, ensuring their pronunciation and recitation were flawless.

Each yajman, who registered for a mahapuja, received an e-invitation card to share with their family and friends. The balaks and karyakars meticulously prepared mahapuja kits at the mandir, ensuring that the yajmans only had to arrange for a few items, such as fresh flowers, thal and arti. This included the mahapuja plates for the number of yajman guests (ranging from 5 to 35), which were prepared in advance by the dedicated children.

INSPIRING STORIES OF DEVOTION

Several heart-warming stories emerged from this *seva*, showcasing the unwavering devotion of the young *balaks*.

Harshbhai Patel demonstrated remarkable determination when, despite being unwell, insisted on proceeding with the *mahapuja* rituals rather than finding a replacement at his mother's suggestion. He completed the entire ritual with enthusiasm, proving that his dedication transcended any physical ailment.

Similarly, Harikrishnabhai Gadhvi, who was visiting Dar es Salaam from India for a vacation, chose to spend his holiday in *seva* rather than sightseeing. Upon learning about the *mahapuja* project, he generously donated the amount he would have spent on his vacation to the *murti* fund.

Another inspiring balak, Yogirajbhai Patel, skillfully balanced his seva with school exams and memorizing the Satsang Diksha. Living an hour away from the mandir didn't deter him from arriving on time for every mahapuja. Despite his busy schedule, he also excelled academically.

Even the youngest *balak*, 8-year-old Parambhai Gandhi, exhibited extraordinary dedication. During one *mahapuja*, he lost a tooth due to a toothache, yet after a quick rinse,

he returned to complete the ritual despite the discomfort.

This project also inspired *karyakars* like Mayankbhai Patel, who, despite suffering from a slipped disk, joined the *seva*. His joyful participation, even in pain, motivated those around him and showcased the true spirit of dedication.

YAJMAN PRASANGS: TRANSFORMING HOMES

The experience of the *yajmans* was equally transformative. Jigarbhai Patel remarked, "Their pronunciation was crystal clear, and their dedication was remarkable. Even adults struggle to recite these prayers as perfectly as they did. The atmosphere in our home felt divinely charged after the *mahapuja*."

Dhirmirbhai Patel was amazed by the linguistic prowess of the *balaks*, stating, "In a world where English dominates, it's rare to see young children fluently reciting in Sanskrit and Gujarati. I'm inspired to involve my own children in such initiatives in the future."

Vinodbhai Patel expressed his joy by saying, "It felt like Swamishri himself had come to our home in the form of these young *balaks*. The *mahapuja* was conducted so perfectly, with a deep sense of devotion. I have never experienced such a divine ritual in my lifetime."

A PROJECT TO REMEMBER

This monumental project not only brought the community closer but also fostered a sense of unity and devotion among the children and *bal karyakars*. The atmosphere at every home was filled with joy, devotion and a feeling of divine grace. Moreover, the project instilled valuable lessons of time management, perseverance and devotion in the young participants.



Dar es Salaam Kishori Mandal *Bake Sale*


APS Dar es Salaam Kishori Mandal embraced an inspiring initiative by hosting weekly bake sales to raise funds for the new *murti* of Ghanshyam Maharaj. When the call to participate in this significant cause arose, the *kishoris* gathered for a brainstorming session, exploring various ideas. They decided on weekly bake sales — a plan that was not only practical but also offered a steady stream of funds while engaging the community.

Each *kishori* willingly took on a role, ensuring the smooth running of the project. Specific roles were assigned, such as head of baking, head of decor and setup, and head of cash collection. These leaders were tasked with ensuring others signed up to either bring homemade baked goods, gather in groups to bake together or volunteer at the stall. The commitment was such that the *kishoris* personally bought all the necessary ingredients. This aspect not only contributed to the fundraiser but also created opportunities for bonding and camaraderie outside the usual satsang *sabhas*.

A delightful array of treats like cupcakes, doughnuts, cake pops, mini pizzas, fruit custard and biscuit pudding were prepared each week by the *kishoris*. Inspired by the *kishoris*' dedication, others outside the *mandal*, including ladies from the congregation, began contributing to the cause as well, offering items like black forest shots, vegetable puffs, cold cocoa and cookies. Beyond the baked items, the *kishoris* took full

ownership of other logistical elements, such as securing cash containers, takeaway packaging, and stall decorations. Their meticulous attention to detail ensured each week's sale ran smoothly and maintained a vibrant, welcoming atmosphere.

One particularly innovative idea was the introduction of a live waffle counter. This concept evolved from the bake sale and featured fresh, hot waffles prepared on-site after sabha. With help from experienced volunteers, the kishoris made the waffle batter, arranged toppings like chocolate, honey, crushed nuts, fruits and icing sugar, and then worked at the stall, making the waffles to order. The live waffle counter was an instant success, with long queues each week. It quickly became a highlight of the bake sale, bringing in both funds and excitement. Seeing how well-received the waffle counter was, the kishoris decided to expand their participation and featured their own live waffle stall at the food mela, another major event in the mandir's calendar. Their creativity, hard work, and teamwork made this bake sale initiative not just a fundraising event but a celebration of unity, devotion and community spirit. The BAPS Dar es Salaam Kishori Mandal's weekly bake sales exemplify how even small efforts, when backed by dedication and collective action, can create a meaningful impact for a cherished cause.



Brahmaswarup Shastriji Maharaj and the tireless efforts of Nirgundas Swami, the BAPS Swaminarayan Sanstha spread across East Africa in the past century. Brahmaswarup Yogiji Maharaj visited the region and established mandirs dedicated to the pure Akshar-Purushottam upasana. Thereafter, Pramukh Swami Maharaj expanded this divine mission.

In 1999, Pramukh Swami Maharaj gifted the devotees of East Africa a magnificent *shikharbaddha* mandir in Nairobi. Thereafter, through the efforts of swamis and devotees satsang has grown in the surrounding regions, attracting many to immerse themselves in the nectar of satsang. Visits by Pramukh Swami Maharaj and Mahant Swami Maharaj have continued to nurture the satsang.

After becoming the guru of BAPS, Mahant Swami Maharaj visited Nairobi in 2017 and 2019, offering spiritual bliss to the devotees. During his third visit to the African continent, Swamishri graced Nairobi from 31 December

2024 to 28 January 2025 to bless the silver jubilee celebrations of the BAPS Swaminarayan Mandir in Nairobi and spiritually enrich devotees through devotion-filled events.

The following *vicharan* report offers a glimpse into the various inspiring programmes celebrated in Swamishri's divine presence.

31 December 2024: Arrival

Resident swamis and senior devotees welcomed Swamishri at Jomo Kenyatta Airport with garlands and joyous chants. Upon his arrival at the BAPS Mandir in Nairobi, the melodies of the renowned Yogi Marching Band of Nairobi resonated through the air. Swamishri proceeded to the sacred *charanarvind* installed in the mandir courtyard, which hold historic memories associated with Yogiji Maharaj and Pramukh Swami Maharaj.

On the occasion of the silver jubilee celebrations of the Nairobi Mandir, Swamishri performed the *pujan* and reinstallation of these *charanarvind*.

The evening Welcome Assembly began with a grand *palkhi yatra* honouring Shri Akshar-Purushottam Maharaj to the melodious tunes played by Yogi Marching Band.

Balaks dressed as young rishikumars welcomed Swamishri by reciting verses about the glory of saints from the Vedas, Upanishads, Purans, Itihasas, Vachanamrut, Swamini Vato, and compositions of devotee-poets.

In honour of Swamishri's visit, over 1,300 devotees – including children aged three to elders aged seventy-five – from 50 centres in 13 African countries had observed extra *niyams*, devotion

3 January: Children's Day

The evening assembly celebrated Children's Day. Through an inspiring 'Masai of Mara' dialogue, *balaks* from various BAPS centres

in Kenya presented valuable lessons on unity and overcoming negative tendencies, drawing inspiration from the diverse wildlife and natural environment of Kenya's famous Masai Mara National Reserve.

Swamishri then blessed, "In reality, we are lions, not sheep. True lions. Roaming freely in the jungle, fearless of anything. But when we get caught in *maya*, we mistake ourselves for the body and start meowing like a cat. Let us imbibe Yogi Bapa's words: 'We are the *atma*, not the body.' Do you realize how much strength the *atma* possesses? We must see ourselves as lions, rise above *maya*, and fear no one. Our true identity is the *atma*, and the *atma* is fearless."

4 January: Ghar Sabha Day

The evening Ghar Sabha Day assembly was celebrated at the Jamhuri High School grounds. Cultural presentations, videos, and inspiring speeches by swamis highlighted the importance of *ghar sabha* – the ultimate solution prescribed by Pramukh Swami Maharaj for nurturing peace, harmony, and love within the home.

During a Q&A session, Swamishri emphasized, "Pramukh Swami Maharaj has given us the divine, unparalleled gift of *ghar sabha*. We must recognize its importance and conduct it regularly – if not daily, then at least twice a week. It will naturally

In 1999, Pramukh Swami Maharaj inaugurated the magnificent *shikharbaddha* BAPS Mandir in Nairobi, the capital city of Kenya. Over the past 25 years, this mandir has transformed the lives of countless individuals, played a vital role in preserving Sanatan Dharma traditions and fostered Satsang across Africa.

To commemorate the mandir's Silver Jubilee, the grand evening assembly on the vast grounds of Jamhuri High School featured a captivating cultural programme on the theme 'Nairobi in the Presence of the Satpurush'. The inspiring journey of the BAPS Mandir in Nairobi was brought to life through compelling presentations. Additionally, local African youths performed a dance tribute to the lyrics of a Swahili bhajan. Also, on this occasion, Swamishri unveiled the book, *Nairobi in the Presence of the Satpurush*.

The evening celebrations concluded with a dazzling fireworks display that illuminated Nairobi's night sky.

7 January: Nakuru Mandir Silver Jubilee Celebration

During the evening assembly in Nairobi, the Silver Jubilee of the BAPS Mandir in Nakuru, Kenya, was commemorated. Established in 1999 by Pramukh Swami Maharaj, the BAPS Mandir in Nakuru has been a sacred hub of Sanatan Vedic values and spiritual inspiration for the past 25 years.

This special assembly featured various cultural presentations and speeches by swamis, and also highlighted the inspiring accounts of dedicated devotees who have selflessly served the Nakuru Mandir. Thereafter, Swamishri blessed, "This mandir [in Nakuru] has greatly enriched everyone's satsang journey. May everyone continue to firmly uphold satsang in their lives and deepen its divine impact. I pray that all the devotees of Nakuru remain spiritually fulfilled and experience true happiness in their lives."

9 January: Youths from the UK and Europe with Swamishri & Kishore Din

Pramukh Swami Maharaj had instructed BAPS youths from abroad to undertake a pilgrimage to India at least once to visit sacred sites and experience the essence of Sanatan Dharma. Accordingly, BAPS Bal-Balika and Yuvak-Yuvati Mandals worldwide have been organizing such pilgrimages for years, enriching their spiritual and cultural foundations.

Recently, youths from the UK and Europe had embarked on a pilgrimage to sacred sites in Kutch and Khandesh (Maharashtra) associated with Bhagwan Swaminarayan and Shastriji Maharaj. On their return journey to London, they arrived in Nairobi for the darshan of Mahant Swami Maharaj.

In a special session with Swamishri, swamis presented a detailed report of the pilgrimage and shared that the youths had performed thousands of *malas* to pray for his good health. During their

pilgrimage, the youths had also collected special keepsakes, which Swamishri sanctified. Blessing them with cherished memories and heartfelt guidance, Swamishri inspired and spiritually uplifted each participant.

11 January

12 January: Bhagwati Diksha & Upkar Din

Thereafter, Swamishri performed the Vedic worship rituals of the bricks for the new BAPS Mandir in Kisumu.

On this auspicious day, as part of the Nairobi Mandir Silver Jubilee, a grand 'Mandir Vandana' programme was organized. The day also marked the conclusion of the Aksharbrahma Gunatit Satra, presented by BAPS swamis through online discourses over the preceeding fortnight.

In the evening assembly, children presented the principles of the Akshar-Purushottam upasana in the form of a scriptural debate based on the Hindu shastras and history. Additionally, he gave vartman to infants, children, and new aspirants, initiating them into the spiritual refuge of Bhagwan Swaminarayan by imparting the sadhana and ashray mantras.

During the evening Sunday assembly, devotees from Uganda enthusiastically celebrated Prapti Day. On this occasion, Swamishri inaugurated *Ghar Sabha Curriculum*, an English translation of the Gujarati book *Ghar Sabha Sahayika*. May Shriji Maharaj bless you all with happiness, wealth and well-being. Though this service may seem small, its true value is immense. Offering time for

Following this, through a Q&A session, Swamishri provided insightful guidance on *seva*, further strengthening the volunteers' commitment to their selfless service.

26 January: India's Republic Day & Farewell Assembly

BAPS mandirs and satsang centres organized flag-hoisting ceremonies to celebrate India's 76th

Republic Day, expressing their patriotism and devotion to the nation.

In the morning, at the BAPS Mandir in Nairobi, a flag-hoisting ceremony was also held in the divine presence of Mahant Swami Maharaj, BAPS swamis and devotees, who paid tribute to the nation with deep reverence and patriotism.

Farewell Assembly

For four weeks, Mahant Swami Maharaj had blessed devotees and well-wishers with his divine presence and discourses in Nairobi.

Thousands of devotees gathered for the evening farewell assembly, themed "Stay With Us, Mahant Swami..." Various devotional presentations were made by devotees of East Africa. As a symbol of their unbreakable spiritual bond, a long sacred thread (nadachhadi) was passed through the assembly and finally presented to Swamishri, allowing everyone to experience his divine association, while swamis sang the heartfelt kirtan: "Pyare tori mori preet na chhute re..."

Accepting everyone's devotion and heartfelt emotions, Swamishri expressed, "By the grace of Bhagwan, we have given you all joy, but you have given us immeasurable happiness! We exist because of you. On this occasion, Swamishri sanctified the African continent on a world map. After his stays in Dar es Salaam and Nairobi, Mahant Swami Maharaj departed for Johannesburg, South Africa, on 28 January.

SWAMISHRI IN JOHANNESBURG

Nearly a century ago, Brahmaswarup Shastriji Maharaj blessed Africa, foretelling the grand expansion of Satsang on this continent. Inspired by this divine vision, a handful of dedicated devotees from Gujarat migrated to

Africa for business, sowing the first seeds of the Swaminarayan Satsang here.

These early seeds of devotion were nurtured by Yogiji Maharaj and Pramukh Swami Maharaj, who illuminated this land with dharma and spirituality. With the blessings of Shastriji Maharaj and Yogiji Maharaj, and through the selfless service of devotees, Pramukh Swami Maharaj established BAPS mandirs in key cities across East and South Africa, spreading the divine light of spirituality.

The mandirs, rooted in the Vedic Akshar-Purushottam Swaminarayan tradition of Sanatan Dharma, have instilled timeless Hindu values among devotees and well-wishers. As a result, the vibrancy of satsang and devotion has continued to blossom.

In 1988, Pramukh Swami Maharaj resolved to establish a mandir in Johannesburg, South Africa's city of gold. Subsequently, on 22 September 1991, Pramukh Swami Maharaj consecrated a mandir in the Mayfair suburb. Thereafter, as the Indian community in this area gradually expanded, the Satsang community also flourished, and the number of devotees grew significantly. To accommodate for this growth, Pramukh Swami Maharaj planted the seed for a larger mandir.

In accordance with this vision, on 25 March 2017, Mahant Swami Maharaj laid the foundation stone to mark the auspicious beginning of the

new mandir complex on the land acquired along the Johannesburg-Lenasia Highway in the North Riding area.

Since then, with the blessings of Mahant Swami Maharaj, and through the efforts of the resident swamis and local devotees the first phase of BAPS Hindu Mandir Complex has been successfully completed.

To inaugurate the newly built BAPS Haveli and perform the *murti-pratishtha*, Mahant Swami Maharaj remained in Johannesburg from 28 January to 11 February 2025.

The following is an overview of this historic visit.

28 January: Grand Welcome

Youths of South Africa played soulful music and enthusiastically performed a traditional devotional dance, offering their heartfelt homage to God and guru. Swamis and devotees presented national emblems of South Africa to welcome Swamishri.

Swamishri blessed, "The elders and devotees here have profound devotion within. Your deep faith has drawn all the swamis here. Jai Swaminarayan."

Swamishri also blessed the devotees from other parts of South Africa and Botswana who had observed fasts and other austerities to express their devotion and to welcome him.

Then, Swamishri ceremoniously inaugurated the newly built BAPS Cultural Complex (Haveli). The doors of the Haveli were opened and Shri Akshar-Purushottam Maharaj was ceremoniously welcomed inside as the atmosphere reverberated with joyous chants.

This welcome assembly was not just an inauguration ceremony of a cultural complex – it was the culmination of years of heartfelt prayers, selfless services, and unwavering faith of thousands of devotees in South Africa.

30 January: Welcome Assembly

The grand welcome assembly in the evening commenced with a vibrant devotional dance performance by around 60 children and youths, set to the the lyrics of a joyous welcome bhajan. Following this, through various presentations and heartfelt offerings devotees welcomed and honoured Swamishri.

To extend an official welcome on behalf of the nation, Vice President of South Africa, Hon. Paul Mashatile, graced the welcome assembly, accompanied by other dignitaries and esteemed guests. Swamishri bestowed divine blessings upon all, offering prayers for their progress and well-being.

31 January:

Vishwashanti Mahayagna & Community Day

From early morning, devotees eagerly gathered in the yagna hall to participate in the grand Vishwashanti Mahayagna, as part of the Murti-Pratishtha Mahotsav. Swamishri arrived and formally initiated the yagna by invoking Agnidev into the main yagna kund. The sacred fire, kindled on the banks of the Limpopo River at the spot under Beitbridge sanctified by Yogiji Maharaj, was ceremoniously placed by Swamishri in the yagna kund.

The joy in our hearts is beyond words and cannot even be expressed. Those who partake in this elevenday *yagna* will attain the fruits of Akshardham, and both their spiritual and worldly wishes will be fulfilled."

In the evening Community Day assembly, representatives of various communities showcased their devotion and cultural heritage through musical and artistic performances. On behalf of all the participating communities, swamis honoured Swamishri with flower garlands and the distinguished guests shared their heartfelt sentiments through speeches.

Swamishri officially inaugurated the BAPS Cultural Complex by lighting a ceremonial lamp.

Blessing the assembly, he said, "Today, I am overjoyed to see people of different faiths and communities gathered here in unity. On behalf of the BAPS family, I express my heartfelt gratitude to all of you. We deeply appreciate your support, goodwill, generosity, and friendship. Pramukh Swami Maharaj built this mandir and inspired countless others to bring communities together in harmony and dialogue.

"Our guru, Yogiji Maharaj, taught us, 'May Bhagwan do good for all.' If we wish well for all, our unity will grow and extend to every individual. We pray for the welfare of all, and we sincerely wish that every person experiences inner peace and joy."

Swamishri also inaugurated the new Bengali publications published by Swaminarayan Aksharpith.

1 February: Shobha Yatra & Yagnapurush Day

As part of the Murti-Pratishtha Mahotsav, a magnificent *nagar yatra* was held to honour the murtis to be consecrated. The procession featured beautifully adorned chariots carrying the divine murtis. The grand procession commenced from Sandown High School, covering a four-kilometre route before returning to the same location. The *nagar yatra* gracefully proceeded on the public

streets of Johannesburg and was welcomed by all with deep reverence and devotion.

In the evening Yagnapurush Day assembly, heartfelt tributes were offered to Brahmaswarup Shastriji Maharaj through inspiring performances. Local African youths also presented cultural performances, offering their heartfelt respect and admiration for the mandir.

Following speeches by dignitaries, Swamishri, in his blessings, talked about the glory of Shastriji Maharaj and his divine contributions.

2 February: Murti-Pratishtha

Today was Vasant Panchami (Maha *sud 5*); it is the day on which Bhagwan Swaminarayan first revealed the Shikshapatri and also the birthday of Brahmaswarup Shastriji Maharaj, the founder of BAPS. On this 160th birth anniversary of Shastriji Maharaj, Swamishri performed the sacred *murti-pratishtha* of the *murtis* in the BAPS Haveli.

The newly built BAPS Cultural Complex, the first phase of the grand BAPS Mandir Complex envisioned by Pramukh Swami Maharaj, stood in its full splendour, adorned beautifully for this momentous event. Thousands of devotees and swamis from across the world had gathered to witness the sacred *murti-pratishtha* ceremony.

In the grand assembly hall, the divine murtis

of Shri Akshar-Purushottam Maharaj, Shri Ghanshyam Maharaj, Shri Radha-Krishna, Shri Ram-Sita-Hanuman, Shri Shiv-Parvati-Ganesh, Shri Venkatesh Balaji, and Shri Murugan (Kartikeya), along with the Guru Parampara, had been ceremoniously placed in a golden *sinhasan*.

At the designated time, Mahant Swami Maharaj arrived to perform the *pratishtha* rituals, taking his seat before the *murtis* of Shri Akshar-Purushottam Maharaj, while senior swamis performed the rituals for the other *murtis*. Swamis and pandits recited the sacred Vedic mantras as part of the *pratishtha* rituals.

In his blessings, Mahant Swami Maharaj expressed, "With immense grace, Shriji Maharaj manifest in this universe. That is why we experience such divine joy and bliss today. Shriji Maharaj's boundless grace has expanded Satsang everywhere, even in Western countries. As a result, devotees and swamis around the world are immersed in divine happiness."

Then, Swamishri offered an *annakut* to Thakorji and performed the sacred *arti*.

In the evening, a grand assembly to celebrate the haveli inauguration was held in the presence of distinguished guests. Through various presentations, heartfelt gratitude was expressed to Swamishri. All the swamis and devotees who had contributed to the construction of the haveli were also honoured.

In his blessings, Swamishri recalled how Shastriji Maharaj had endured immense hardships and opposition but remained steadfast in establishing the Akshar-Purushottam *upasana* and constructing mandirs. By sharing these divine incidents on Shastriji Maharaj's birth anniversary, Swamishri expressed his guru bhakti.

For this auspicious day, over a period of three months, 720 women devotees from South Africa, Botswana, and Zimbabwe had lovingly prepared a 22.3-foot-long sesame garland. The resident swamis of Africa honoured Swamishri

with this garland, symbolizing devotion and selfless service to guru. A total of 1,250 families had contributed a fistful of sesame seeds, which were strung together in 9,000 strands to make this garland. Swamishri blessed everyone for their devotion.

On this occasion, Swamishri also inaugurated the two-volume *Brahmaswarup Shastriji Maharaj: Life and Work*, an English translation of Shastriji Maharaj's detailed biography, and the Swahili translation of Satsang Diksha.

4 February: Kishore Din

The evening Kishore Din assembly featured special presentations by *kishores*, centred around the spiritual guidance given by Swamishri in a letter written from Bochasan in 2013.

Based on Pramukh Swami Maharaj's motto, 'In the joy of others lies our own' and Swamishri's letter from 2013, all kishores and kishoris had written heartfelt prayers for others and offered them to Swamishri. A special garland of these prayers, representing the devotion of kishores and kishoris from across South Africa, was presented to Swamishri by Anandswarup Swami. Swamishri also sanctified the diary of prayers and wrote blessings in it: "See divinity in all."

Guiding the youths through a Q&A session, Swamishri shared profound spiritual insights: "Know Shriji Maharaj as the all-doer. Not even a dry leaf can move without his will. Keep this firm in your mind. Shriji Maharaj has given us agna and upasana. Your upasana is firm, but sometimes agna weakens. Therefore, remain firm in observing agna, and sincerely uphold niyams and dharma. Everything is included in niyams and dharma. If you follow agna steadfastly, you will experience true joy and fulfilment."

As an extraordinary offering of devotion, the *kishores* and *kishoris* of South Africa had created a stunning artwork of Brahmaswarup Pramukh Swami Maharaj using 16,400 glass

6 February: Bhakti Din

On this sacred occasion of Bhakti Din, thousands of devotees expressed their heartfelt devotion by performing the *sakar tula* of Shri Akshar-Purushottam Maharaj and Mahant Swami Maharaj.

7 February: Children's Day

The evening Bal-Balika Din (Children's Day) assembly featured interactive dialogues, skits, and cultural performances. Children who had memorized the Satsang Diksha shastra were honoured with certificates and mementoes.

On this occasion, Swamishri bestowed divine blessings upon all the children and the bal karyakars.

8 February: Consecration of Bricks for New Mandir

On the auspicious day of Jaya Ekadashi, Mahant Swami Maharaj performed the sacred *pujan* of the bricks for the new BAPS Hindu Mandir in Johannesburg. Swamishri also sanctified the blueprint of the new mandir by showering flowers on it. Then, Swamishri blessed

everyone that the mandir be completed as soon as possible. Thereafter, Swamishri placed his holy feet on the very spot where the *murtis* of the central sanctum will be placed.

After the rituals, Pujya Tyagvallabh Swami and Anandswarup Swami honoured Swamishri with a garland of Protea, the national flower of South Africa.

In the evening, BAPS swamis presented a melodious kirtan *aradhana* of soulful bhajans and poetic compositions accompanied by a variety of musical instruments.

9 February: Symbolic Pushpadolotsav

A large number of devotees and well-wishers gathered on the premises of the BAPS Cultural Complex for the memorable symbolic Pushpadolotsav celebrated, the first-ever in the presence of Swamishri on South African soil.

After a series of engrossing presentations, Swamishri blessed the assembly with his divine words. He then performed *pujan* of Akshar-Purushottam Maharaj and ceremoniously sprayed them with saffron-scented water. Following this, Swamishri sprayed the sanctified

coloured water upon the swamis and devotees. Swamishri gently swung the ornate *pichkaris* (sprays) arranged along the edge of the stage from side to side to shower streams of coloured water over the devotees, who all rejoiced with spiritual delight and heartfelt gratitude for this rare and divine opportunity.

During his two months in Dar es Salaam, Nairobi and Johannesburg Swamishri granted spiritual bliss upon and strengthened the unwavering faith in the Akshar-Purushottam upasana in devotees of all ages.

On 11 February 2025, Swamishri departed for Melbourne, Australia.

MAHA KUMBH 2025

Sacred Confluence of Devotion, Cosmic Order and Timeless Traditions in Prayagraj 13 January to 26 February 2025

he recent Maha Kumbh in Prayagraj, revered as the largest spiritual congregation on Earth, was a confluence of faith, unity, celestial alignments and sacred traditions. It was where millions united in devotion, swamis and sannyasis engaged in scriptural sermons and dialogues, and seekers immersed themselves in the purifying dip at the sacred confluence of Rivers Ganga, Yamuna and Saraswati. Rooted in Sanatan Dharma, the Maha Kumbh was more than just a mega event, in which 66.3 crore devotees took the holy dip over a period of 45 days, from 14 January to 26 February 2025.

This grand congregation brought together millions in search of divine connection, where every drop at the confluence was sacred and divine and every dip was believed to dissolve sins and grant *moksha*. At the Maha Kumbh,

spirituality was interwoven into every ritual, prayer and sacred offering, creating an awe-inspiring panorama of devotion and faith. The radiance of Sanatan Dharma illuminated every corner, making it a sacred spectacle that cut through gender, generation, class and race. A very large number of youths from many parts of India had come to take the holy dip.

UNPARALLELED IN SCALE: THE LARGEST HUMAN GATHERING

The Maha Kumbh drew millions from across the globe. The 2013 Prayagraj Kumbh witnessed a record-breaking 12 to 13 crore devotees over a month, earning a place in the *Guinness World Records*. The figures for Maha Kumbh 2025 in Prayagraj were staggering, surpassing the combined populations of the United States, Canada and Russia. In addition, if one were to



rank the Maha Kumbh as a country, with respect to the number of people who attended, then it would stand after India and China.

The Uttar Pradesh state government's meticulous planning and Herculean efforts in creating a 32 km² spiritual township was most praiseworthy. The township had thousands of Hindu *sampradayas*, which had set up spiritual camps (*shivirs*) vibrant with devotion and discourses.

DIVINE ORIGIN OF THE KUMBH

The sacred origins of Kumbh trace back to the legend of the Samudra Manthan, the churning of the cosmic ocean, after which the devas (gods) and asuras (demons) fought for the amrut (nectar of immortality). As Indra's son Jayant carried the sacred kumbh (pot) of amrut, a battle with the asuras ensued for 12 days, during which drops of nectar fell at four locations — Prayagraj, Haridwar, Nashik and Ujjain. The responsibility of protecting this pot was placed upon the Sun, Moon and Jupiter, and hence, the Kumbh Mela is celebrated based on their celestial alignment.

Though the Puranas do not explicitly mention

the Kumbh Mela, the tradition has evolved over centuries through sacred oral traditions and astronomical calculations.

FREQUENCY AND TYPES OF KUMBH

The Kumbh Mela follows a precise astronomical cycle rather than occurring at fixed intervals. There are three types of Kumbh:

- Purna Kumbh (Full Kumbh): Every 12 years, rotating between the four locations.
- Ardha Kumbh (Half Kumbh): Every 6 years, held only in Prayagraj and Haridwar.
- Maha Kumbh: Once every 144 years, celebrated only in Prayagraj.

Contrary to common belief, the Kumbh Mela is not held every three years. Instead, the gaps between them are determined by planetary alignments.

Additionally, Chinese traveller Xuanzang (Hiuen Tsang) recorded a mass spiritual gathering in the 7th century during King Harshavardhan's reign, which is believed to be an early reference to the Kumbh Mela.

THE AKHADAS: DEFENDERS OF DHARMA

Akhadas are monastic orders of ascetics, first





organized by Adi Shankaracharya in the 7th century to protect mandirs and preserve Sanatan Dharma. There are 13 main *akhadas*:

- 7 Shaiv Akhadas (followers of Shiva)
- 3 Vaishnav Akhadas (followers of Vishnu)
- 3 Udasin Akhadas (ascetic monks, including Sikh saints).

The Juna Akhadas of Varanasi is the largest, with over 5 lakh sadhus. The Kinnar Akhada, introduced in 2019, provides representation for transgender ascetics. During the Kumbh Mela, the government allocates land to these *akhadas* and many other Sanatan religious organizations, where they conduct *yagnas*, mantra *japs, diksha* initiations, and scriptural discussions, and other devotional activities.

SPIRITUAL LANDMARKS AND CAMPS

The Maha Kumbh 2025 offered devotees a rare opportunity to experience the spiritual essence of India's most revered religious organizations, all within the sacred grounds of Prayagraj. Across the vast 25-sector expanse of the Maha Kumbh Mela, various religious institutions, spiritual leaders and ashrams established elaborate camps and mandir replicas, transforming the site into a vibrant spiritual township. A few of them are as follows:

- Sector 1: A replica of the Ayodhya Ram Mandir, offered devotees a chance to experience the sanctity of the newly inaugurated temple at Shri Ram Janmabhoomi.
- Sector 6: Darshan of 12 Shivlings made of *rudraksh*, represented the sacred Jyotirlings.

The BAPS Swaminarayan Akshardham Camp was a beacon of spiritual wisdom and devotion.

The Tirupati Balaji Mandir allowed pilgrims to experience the divine aura of Bhagwan Venkateshwar.

Netra Kumbh, a free eye camp run by the Rashtriya Swayamsevak Sangh (RSS).

A camp by Pujya Rambhadracharya Ji Maharaj, a revered scholar and religious leader, included a large assembly hall and *yagnashala*.

- Sector 7: A magnificent chariot of Ma Kamakhya, honouring the revered Shakti Peeth of Assam.
- Sector 9: A replica of Kedarnath, brought the essence of the sacred Himalayan shrine to the Maha Kumbh.
- Sector 9: Camp of Pujya Kailashanand Giri Maharaj, a distinguished spiritual guru.
- Sector 9: Divya Jyoti Jagrati Sansthan, dedicated to spreading Vedic wisdom and self-realization.
- Sector 18: A camp of Pujya Acharya



Avdheshanand Giri Ji Maharaj, the Mahamandaleshwar of Juna Akhadas and a prominent leader of Hinduism.

■ Sector 19: ISKCON camp and *bhandara*, where devotees could listen to kirtans, Bhagavad Gita discourses, and partake of *prasad*.

From grand religious congregations to serene meditation spaces, the Maha Kumbh was a living testimony to India's rich spiritual heritage and the enduring faith of millions.

FOUR PRINCIPAL HOLY DIPS (SNAN)

The Akhil Bharatiya Akhada Parishad determined the dates for Shahi Snan (Royal Bath), where sadhus bathed first, followed by other pilgrims and devotees. The four most significant bathing dates were:

- Makar Sankranti (First Shahi Snan) on 14 January.
- 2. Mauni Amavasya (Pradhan Snan, the most significant Snan) on 29 January.
- 3. Vasant Panchami, Maghi Purnima on 3 February.
- 4. Maha Shivratri on 26 February.

KALPAVAS TRADITION

During the Kumbh Mela, hundreds of

devout participants, known as Kalpavasis, undertook a month-long spiritual retreat called Kalpavas. From Posh Purnima (13 January) to Maghi Purnima (12 February), they resided at the Kumbh Mela site, leading a disciplined and minimalist lifestyle. Their daily routine included an early morning bath in the River Ganga, meditation, scripture recitation, and consumption of simple, sattvic meals cooked by themselves. The Kalpavasis slept in tents laid with straw and observed celibacy.

WORLD'S LARGEST RELIGIOUS GATHERING

Commencing on 13 January and concluding on 26 February 2025, the Maha Kumbh Mela was the largest religious event in the world. To accommodate the unprecedented influx, Uttar Pradesh government established a temporary city on the banks of River Ganga spanning 4,000 hectares, with 25 sectors, equipped with 150,000 tents, *mandaps* and other facililties.

ECONOMIC IMPACT

The Kumbh not only showcased spiritual devotion, but also significantly boosted the local economy. The influx of pilgrims and tourists stimulated various sectors, including hospitality,



transportation and retail, underscoring the event's multifaceted importance.

ENVIRONMENTAL MANAGEMENT

With millions of pilgrims scheduled to take ritual baths, pollution concerns for the Ganga and Yamuna rivers were considered and resolved. Managing an event of such magnitude necessitated meticulous environmental planning. The organizers implemented extensive measures to ensure sanitation, waste management and preservation of the sacred rivers' sanctity.

A COMMITMENT TO HEALTH AND SAFETY

The Maha Kumbh Nagar administration ensured healthcare services for the millions of devotees who attended the Maha Kumbh. To provide a safe and secure pilgrimage experience, extensive medical facilities were deployed across the township, including:

- 13 temporary clinics and 10 first-aid posts
- 125 road ambulances
- 17 river ambulances
- 1 air ambulance.

SECURITY AND SAFETY MEASURES

The Maha Kumbh was safeguarded

with comprehensive security arrangements, ensuring a safe and seamless experience for millions of pilgrims. Extensive measures were implemented, including:

- 3 Jal Police Stations and 18 Control Rooms for round-the-clock vigilance.
- 4,300 fire hydrants and 50 fire stations to ensure fire safety.
- 50 watchtowers monitored every corner of the event.
- To ensure the safety of pilgrims, 37,000 police and security personnel and AI-powered surveillance systems were deployed.
- Modern infrastructure enhancements, including efficient transportation networks and upgraded public facilities were implemented to facilitate seamless movement and accessibility.

TECHNOLOGICAL INTEGRATION

Embracing modernity, the Kumbh Mela had incorporated technology to enhance the pilgrim experience. Innovations such as mobile applications for navigation, real-time updates, and digital payment systems had been introduced for convenience.



CULTURAL CONFLUENCE

Beyond its religious significance, the Maha Kumbh Mela served as a melting pot of cultures. Attendees from various Indian states, countries and backgrounds converged, fostering intercultural dialogues, artistic expressions, and a shared sense of humanity, thereby enriching the festival's universal appeal.

CONCEPT OF TEMPORARY TOWNSHIP

The Kumbh Mela transformed the dry Ganga bed into a fully functional township with well-planned roads, sanitation, electricity and water supplies, despite being temporary. This aspect attracted urban planners who studied the festival's logistics as a model for disaster management and large-scale human congregation management.

MASSIVE INFRASTRUCTURE FOR HYGIENE

The Maha Kumbh, which expected over 500 million pilgrims, implemented extensive sanitation facilities, including 28,000 toilets, 20,000 urinals and 20,000 dustbins to ensure cleanliness across the grounds.

Over 3.77 million liner bags were distributed for waste segregation, promoting recycling and

eco-friendly practices. 'Ganga Seva Doots' ensured swift removal of waste from the sacred waters.

GLOBAL ACADEMIC INTEREST IN MAHA KUMBH MELA

The Maha Kumbh Mela attracted leading institutions like Harvard, Stanford, London School of Economics, AIIMS, IITs and IIMs, which aimed to study various aspects of the event, including its socio-economic impact, crowd management and cultural significance.

Key Research Areas

- Economic Impact: Assessed tourist spending and financial outcomes.
- Crowd Management: Analyzed strategies for handling massive gatherings.
- Sanitation & Waste Management: Evaluated sustainable practices.
- Cultural and Anthropological Studies: Examined traditions and social interactions.
- Food Distribution Chains: Investigated logistics behind feeding millions.

SEAMLESSLY MANAGED SPIRITUAL EXPERIENCE

Pilgrims and swamis alike praised the smooth arrangements, robust security and well-organized

management at the Maha Kumbh. With the dedicated efforts of the Uttar Pradesh Government and UP Police, every sacred dip at the Triveni Sangam remained a safe and enriching experience.

GLOBAL SPIRITUAL EXPERIENCE

The event attracted international visitors from countries like South Korea, Japan, Spain, Russia, and the United States, who were fascinated by its grandeur. At the Sangam Ghat, many engaged with local guides to understand the cultural and spiritual significance of the festival.

The Maha Kumbh was a sacred gathering

that transcended all barriers of caste, creed, wealth and status. Here, the rich and the poor stood as equals, taking the holy dip together, sharing meals at *bhandaras* and recieving divine blessings.

As the largest spiritual congregation on earth, the Maha Kumbh united seekers in a sacred symphony of self-realization and devotion. It aligned nature, humanity and divine wisdom, to ensure that the essence of Sanatan Dharma continued to inspire future generations. In every prayer, every offering, and every sacred moment, the Maha Kumbh stood as a testament to the enduring power of Hindu faith and cultural heritage.

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BAPS Swaminarayan Akshardham Camp at Maha Kumbh 2025

A Divine Hub of Seva, Spirituality and Harmony

Inspired by *guruhari* Mahant Swami Maharaj, the Swaminarayan Akshardham Camp at the Maha Kumbh 2025 in Prayagraj embodied the values of faith, devotion, service and unity at the world's largest spiritual gathering, and provided uplifting experiences to thousands of devotees and pilgrims.

SWAMINARAYAN AKSHARDHAM CAMP: WALKTHROUGH

On two acres of land allocated by the Maha Kumbh organizing committee of the Uttar Pradesh state government, the Swaminarayan Akshardham Camp was set up in Sector 6 under the supervision of Munivatsal Swami, and other BAPS swamis and volunteers from Swaminarayan Akshardham, New Delhi.

The camp comprised a majestic entrance gate, sabha mandap housing murtis of many deities of Sanatan Dharma, yagna arena, exhibitions, accommodation tents for pilgrims and volunteers, and kitchen and dining areas. Following the bhumi pujan ceremony on 29 December, the camp was fully constructed in just 15 days.

The grand entrance welcomed pilgrims with exquisite images of Swaminarayan Akshardham in New Delhi, Gandhinagar and Robbinsville and the BAPS Swaminarayan Mandirs in Nairobi, Abu Dhabi and London.

As visitors entered, they were inspired on both sides by darshan of the statues of some of Sanatan Dharma's great saints and devotees, highlighting their wisdom and contributions.

In the forecourt of the camp was the traditional yagna mandap, where Vishwashanti Yagna ceremonies were conducted five times a day for 45 days by scholars from the BAPS Sanskrit Mahavidyalaya in Sarangpur. Participating couples and families performed sacred Vedic rituals and offered homas for world

peace, family unity and spiritual enlightenment into the continuously burning sacred *yagna* flame. Devotees from across India, England, America, Canada, and other countries, participated in this *yagna*, offering their heartfelt prayers. Throughout the 45-day *yagna*, more than 11,000 *yajmans* offered 180,000 sacred oblations. The *yagna* culminated in the presence of Pujya Tyagvallabh Swami and Pujya Viveksagar Swami, along with over 100 BAPS swamis, who offered sanctified coconuts as a final tribute to the holy *yagna* flame.

Two special exhibition areas, 'Muktanand' and 'Nityanand', flanked the *yagna mandap*, enlightening pilgrims on how to lead an addiction-free life, strengthen family bonds, and uphold values that foster harmony within homes, society and the nation. Here, thousands of devotees pledged to lead addiction-free lives and embrace family values.

Beyond the yagna mandap was the sabha mandap, which housed the murtis of Bhagwan Swaminarayan, Aksharbrahma Gunatitanand Swami (Shri Akshar-Purushottam Maharaj) and the Gunatit gurus; Bhagwan Shri Krishna and Radhaji; Bhagwan Shri Ram, Sitaji and Hanumanji, Bhagwan Shri Shiv, Parvatiji and Ganeshji, and Bhagwan Shri Narayan and Lakshmiji.

The sabha mandap provided all pilgrims a sacred space for worship and devotion. Pilgrims also benefitted from the daily morning and evening arti, bhajans, and

The Conundrum of Modernity



erriam-Webster defines 'modern' as "a characteristic related to the present time," with synonyms such as 'contemporary' or 'up-to-date'. It is believed that the modern era began with colonialism, then shaped by the two world wars, globalization and eventually gave way to the postmodern era. This period is marked by a strong emphasis on individualism, the growth of a scientific temperament, rational thinking, and rapid urbanization. It has also given rise to new ideas, innovations, universal adult suffrage, and equality in work opportunities.

Yet modernity often comes with a cost. In its bid to revolutionize society, many pre-modern beliefs and traditions are abandoned in favour of new ideas. A progressive society is judged not only by how quickly it discards harmful or outdated systems, but also by the consequences of leaving behind long-held moral values and time-tested knowledge systems that once served as its anchor.

According to the Global State of Connection Report, in 2023 approximately 1.25 billion people felt 'lonely' or 'very lonely'. Even with access to the most modern technological amenities and a world connected physically and virtually, urban loneliness has become a silent epidemic. This isolation is linked to various physical and mental health issues. Although modern society is rich in connections, suicide remains the third largest cause of death worldwide. In India, female suicides rank as the third largest cause of death and male suicides as the fourth, with 80% of these tragedies attributed to family problems, mental health issues, drug abuse, bankruptcy, and sudden economic hardship; many of which are problems of our modern era.

'India' or 'Bharat', a land where the elderly have traditionally been revered as deities and where the ancient teachings such as, "Matru devo bhava, pitru devo bhava" were once imparted in gurukuls (and still survive in some religious institutions), now faces a rising trend of urban isolation. Many elderly citizens are being abandoned by their children and placed in old age homes: a by-product of rapid urbanization and increasing influence of modern occidental society. In this situation, one

must ask: Is modernity merely about technological advancement, or does it also mean discarding all past traditions in the name of progress?

Some aspects of this conundrum are addressed by a postulate of post-modern thought, which warns that the unguided use of technology and science can lead to destruction and oppression. Unchecked development, without proper guidance, can endanger the well-being and unity of society. Here, the ancient shastras of Sanatan Dharma offer a holistic view to balance the challenges of modernity.

The Mundaka Upanishad (1.1.4) emphasizes the pursuit of two kinds of knowledge: para vidya (spiritual knowledge) and apara vidya (material knowledge). Spiritual knowledge is sought for self liberation, while material knowledge is acquired to navigate worldly affairs. Our shastras stress the importance of balancing both: knowledge that is merely learned in words, without being internalized, cannot alleviate the sufferings of everyday life. Similarly, Bhagwan Swaminarayan explains the true measure of intellect in Vachanamrut Gadhada I 50:

"Some people may be extremely adept in worldly affairs, yet they do nothing at all to safeguard their own liberation. Others may know the precise meanings of the various shastras, Purans and Itihas scriptures, yet they too do nothing to safeguard their liberation. Therefore, they cannot be said to possess a sharp intellect; rather, they possess a blunt intellect. Conversely, a person who safeguards his liberation, even though he may possess only a limited intellect, should be considered to have a sharp intellect. On the

other hand, a person who, even though possessing a sharp intellect, pays more attention to worldly affairs should be considered to possess a blunt intellect. Therefore, only one who remains alert regarding his own liberation can be said to possess a sharp intellect."

In other words, the solution to the conundrum of modernity is to remain well-versed in contemporary knowledge while also embracing spiritual wisdom. Spiritual knowledge offers direction and balance, ensuring that material progress does not come at the expense of inner growth. This balanced approach helps maintain harmony between one's external achievements and internal wellbeing.

Today, this balanced service to society is provided by the spiritual centres of the Bochasanwasi Akshar Purushottam Swaminarayan Sanstha (BAPS). Guided by the inspiration of Pramukh Swami Maharaj and the present guru, Mahant Swami Maharaj, BAPS supports over 1,300 mandirs worldwide and more than 5,000 satsang centres for children, youth, and the elderly. These mandirs and satsang centres not only serve as hubs for spiritual development but also host a wide range of activities. They foster traditional culture and personality development through scriptural study, cultural performances, youth development and leadership training programmes, workplace skills seminars, women empowerment conferences, family value initiatives, de-addiction campaigns, sports tournaments and other activities. All these efforts aim to promote holistic development in contemporary society while balancing modern progress with traditional values.

The event was supported by Cambridge's Faculty of Divinity, the St Andrews Encyclopaedia of Theology, the Sanskrit Department at Heidelberg University, the BAPS Swaminarayan Research Institute in London, and the Cambridge Interfaith Programme.

The symposium, joined by scholars from around the UK as well as from Finland, Germany, India, the Netherlands, and the USA, facilitated

research and dialogue on various aspects of this vital scripture of the BAPS Swaminarayan Hindu tradition authored by His Holiness Mahant Swami Maharaj.

The papers presented covered contemporary subjects, such as civil law, domestic life, ethical finance, and religious pluralism, as well as some classical topics of theology, philosophy, philology, pedagogy, material culture, textual studies, and others.

The delegates explored the vitality and relevance of a contemporary Sanskrit scripture, and its adherents' spiritual, devotional, and moral way of life.

Key articulations of lived Hinduism and the Swaminarayan tradition's distinctive school of Vedanta, namely, Akshar-Purushottam Darshan, were also discussed.

James Hegarty, Professor of the Religions of South Asia at Cardiff University and one of the convenors of the symposium, explained, "For a text so recent, the extensive range of global public engagement – from the thousands of people, young and old, who have been memorizing its 315 Sanskrit verses, to the thousands joining weekly for an in-depth online course – makes the Satsang Diksha especially worthy of academic study."

Professor Alice Collet, Academic Editor of the Hinduism and Buddhism sections of the St Andrews Encyclopaedia of Theology, reflected, "It was a pleasure to attend the symposium, which was a good balance of academic rigour and a positive collegiate environment."

Dr Ankur Barua, Senior Lecturer in Hindu Studies at the University of Cambridge, appreciated the symposium's collaborative focus, "The symposium brought together doctoral students, established academics, and scholar-practitioners in a series of discussions on how a recently composed scriptural text distils the essence of various Hindu religious themes and presents it in a manner that would be accessible to devotees at the grassroots."



Life and Work, Part 1 & 2







Bhagwan Swaminarayan re-introduced the Hindu practice of eightfold celibacy for his sadhus, thus reconstituting the institution of Hindu asceticism. He established certain boundaries between ascetics and women, and between householder men and women in the context of religious activities that created grounds for women's dignity and independence in an intrinsic sense.






